

MA Sanskrit (Part Time) – GI503

1. CONTEXT AND OBJECTIVES

Sanskrit is the ancient language which seers of India used as a powerful means for the transmission of their wisdom and culture. Its study therefore can enhance critical thinking, improve behaviour and enrich lifestyle. The study of Sanskrit Literature fosters the growth of a harmonious society and becomes especially relevant in the present scenario as there is an erosion in social, ethical and moral values. Thus, knowledge of Sanskrit has the potential to initiate a paradigm shift in life perspectives.

The objective of this postgraduate programme is to provide opportunities for graduates of Sanskrit Language and Literature. It will enable the students to appreciate and critically analyse Classical Sanskrit texts and Modern Sanskrit Literature. It will also provide the students with an avenue for further research in the application of Sanskrit.

Competencies and Career Opportunities

Level 1 & 2 modules cover the main topics and detailed aspects of Sanskrit Literature and Grammar. The modules have been designed to help students achieve expertise in literary analysis and criticism in Sanskrit Literature. They will acquire mastery in Sanskrit language for all communication purposes including reading, performing, speaking and writing. The modules will also help the students to probe into and utilize their growing insight in real life situations.

Career opportunities for postgraduates exist in the field of teaching, consultancy, translation, media among others.

2. LEARNING OUTCOMES

After successful completion of the programme, students should be able to:

- Explain the theoretical structure of Sanskrit Poetry.
- Interpret different genres in Sanskrit Literature.
- Construct complex sentences using advanced grammatical rules.
- Compose essays having advanced sentence structures.
- Discuss critically philosophical concepts in Sanskrit Literature.

3. TEACHING AND LEARNING METHODS

Blended Mode: Face-to-face Lectures, Assignments, Brainstorming, Questioning, Group Discussion/Work, Presentation/Seminars, E-learning (G-Suite/Zoom and Google Meet).

4. ENTRY REQUIREMENT

- **General Requirement**

Successful completion of undergraduate degree with

- at least a Second Class or 50%, whichever is applicable or
- a GPA not less than 2.5 out of 4 or equivalent, from a recognized higher education institution

- **Programme Requirements**

BA (Hons) Degree in Sanskrit or equivalent qualifications acceptable to the UoM/MGI.

- **Exit points:**

The student can exit the Programme with a Post-graduate Diploma or a Post-graduate Certificate as follows:

- Student may exit with a Post-graduate Diploma in Sanskrit after having earned 48 LCCS Credits.
- Student may exit with a Post-graduate Certificate in Sanskrit after having earned 30 LCCS

7. ASSESSMENT AND DEADLINES

All modules will carry 100 marks

7.1 Examinations: 60 %

Examinations will count for 60% of the total marks.

Each module will have a written examination of a duration of 3 hours at the end of the semester.

7.2 Continuous Assessment: 40 %

Continuous assessment will count for 40% of the total marks. Continuous assessment will be based on two (2) class assignments and should include at least one class test per module.

For a student to pass a module, an overall total of 40% for combined continuous assessment and written is required.

7.3 Submission Deadline for Dissertation:

Students will be required to submit an e-copy of their Dissertation to their Dissertation Supervisors through Google Classroom at latest by 5.00 p.m. on date specified in the Calendar of Activities.

The e-copy of the project/ dissertation (main body i.e. Introduction up to the Conclusion or last chapter) should be uploaded on the Turnitin Platform (where applicable) as a single PDF file in the appropriate class/ assignment (final dissertation) provided by the Dissertation Supervisor.

The number of words for the final year dissertation shall be between 10,000 – 14,000.

Assessment for dissertation will include a Viva Voce conducted by a panel including the Dissertation Supervisor.
